


















Research Questions

- What does this event leave for the contemporary warfighter or policymaker?


Research Methodology


- Narrow focus on a specific, significant tactical decision
- Avoid focus on the individual leader (Ranald Mackenzie)
- Analyze the organizational determining factors that led to this decision
- Examine characteristics of the army formation














The Red River War

Research Findings


- Mackenzie's personal experience influenced his decision to slaughter the ponies
 - Previous forays into the Staked Plains
 - Loss of captured horses to native raids while on campaign
- Specific attributes of Mackenzie's command were instrumental in putting him in the position to make the decision to slaughter the captured animals
 - Grit and Discipline
 - Empowerment of Trusted Leaders Up and Down the Chain of Command
 - Reliance on Indigenous Expertise



Conclusion

- Three important attributes reveal what made Ranald Mackenzie's column succeed in the field against a fierce and irregular foe.
- Two of those attributes are evident in the modern army, the third is less clear
- The historical record suggests that the small, professional U.S. Army will need an openness to rely upon experts (outside of the military) to help it adapt to a new or uncertain operational environment.
